# The Vikings: Sources and Contexts

## **Course Outline and** *Pensum*

#### Autumn 2017, NOFI 200-300

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This course analyses the primary sources relating to the Viking Age, from the late 8<sup>th</sup> century to the early 11<sup>th</sup> century. Through a study of the sources, we will analyse, amongst other things, the social institutions of the Viking Age, the conversion to Christianity, trade, warfare, and the impact the Vikings had on European history as a whole. Students can expect to read Old Norse texts in the original, runic inscriptions in the original, and primary sources written in other medieval/classic languages in translation.

#### **Course Requirements**

**Presentation -** Each student will be required be give a presentation. The presentations should be 20 minutes long. The topics will be discussed in class. Each presentation should be accompanied by a handout or powerpoint.

**Written Assignment -** Each student should please complete a written assignment of minimum 750 words (more words are welcome, maximum 2000). Further details to come.
