ENG 224/264, Issues of Race in the US South: A Cultural Journey Mark Ledbetter, Office, HF 254 Wednesday, 10.00-12.00

Through an examination of works in social history, autobiography, fiction, poetry, and music, this course will explore issues of race in the U.S. South. Our course will not only address race relations as they unfold in the 20th and early 21st century, but also interrogate the idea of "race" as a social construct of privilege and power. We will examine the cultural representations of the relationship between whites and Blacks, and such issues as the racialization of social identities, ideas of domination and subordination, and the ways that gender, sexuality, and class are intimately related, if not intertwined with race and racism. While our focus is primarily on the U.S. South, this focus is not to suggest that a conversation about race is or can be limited to the southern United States, and therefore, at times, we will direct our conversation toward the larger "picture" of race relations throughout the U.S.
