## Thesis Writing Preparation for English Literature and Culture

**Course content:** This is a course designed to prepare you for writing your English literature MA thesis. The course consists of writing instruction as well as critical thinking and research methods. By the end of this course you will have a thesis topic, an advisor, and a thesis proposal – and be ready to embark upon writing your English literature MA thesis.

**Learning outcomes:** To gain an understanding of the basic prerequisites, ideals, and conditions of MA-level literary research and thus be prepared to write a thesis.

**Required reading books:** Although not every chapter of these books might be assigned for this class, you will refer to other chapters throughout your thesis writing, so please buy them – available at Akademika, or may be purchased as e-books if possible.

N.B.: The Parker guide will be used in all 3 MA courses in Spring 2018 (and in all MA courses in the future), so please purchase it.

**Obligatory Assignments:** Your "exam" for this course consists of a *mappe*, or portfolio of four assignments you will complete throughout the duration of the course. Detailed assignment sheets will follow; due dates are listed on the schedule on the next page. Each assignment is pass/fail and all assignments must pass for you to pass the course. More detailed directions for each assignment will be distributed during the semester.

Total portfolio consists of:

- [1] Report on 2 theses (2-3 pages)
- [2] Project idea form with two project idea paragraphs (1 page total)
- [3] Annotated bibliography (5 pages)
- [4] Project proposal (2-3 pages)

**Obligatory Attendance:** Attendance is required at 6 of the 8 seminars, including required attendance at the final project proposal workshop (seminar 8). Since this course is a seminar, your class participation in discussion is necessary. It is important that you come to class prepared to discuss the day's assigned topics.

**Grading:** This course is pass/fail. *Obligatory assignments and attendance must be fulfilled to pass the course.*
