## ENG349 Words, words, words

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This course introduces to English morphology and morphological theory. It provides the descriptive, analytical and theoretical tools for studying the internal structure of words as well as the various processes by which words are formed and changed. Special emphasis is placed on the interplay between morphology and other components of the language system, such as phonology and syntax, as well as on diachronic and acquisitional aspects of English morphology.
