

Figurations of Gender and Sexuality in Contemporary World Literature

The curriculum can be read either in original or in (English) translation. The English versions will all be available at either Akademika, Litteraturkiosken (**L**) or in Oria (links given in the list below), and all the lectures will be held in English. The exam can be conducted either in English or in any of the Scandinavian languages.
